Here we go once more, another issue for you to read .



I currently use either Stop Press or Micro design Plus, but the curves are a bit "steppy". Even using MD+ in 265K strip format, the steps are still visible; is there anything better, or am I expecting too much of the humble CPC?.

The st up I use is MD+ to do the graphics (for documents, letters etc.), and then I print the text using Protext and Protype; this gives excellent results as far as the text is concerned, but although the graphics are very good, I would like to produce graphics to the same quality as Protype produces

text (and no, I'm NOT going to buy a PC).


Dear Dave

A HARDWARE TIP.



FROM BRIAN FURSE

If the "Brightness" control of your monitor is fully on and the screen is still on the dull side. Here is a little tip that cured my problem...



Find the internal potentiometer for brightness marked as (BRIGHT). Turn the power back on and very carefully insert a fine screwdriver, insert the potentiometer slot, ad iust

by turning the scredriver clockwise untill the screen is litup.

PLEASE BE WARNED
Messing around inside the monitor with the 'POWER' ON can be dangerous.!!!!!!

Turn off the power, turn the brightness control fully antichockwise.

Remove the back cover of the monitor Look inside and you will see a PCB (Printed circuit board). A horizontal one to the left side beneath the Cathode Ray Tube.

Turn off the power once again and replace the back cover to the monitor.

Now when you turn on the monitor you can adjust the brightness control to suit your needs.

Thanks Brian >>>.....

Remember the 'Cathode Ray Tube 'has been going for some time, like our very own eye's, things get a bit blured, but dont adjust the potentiometer to far, and PLEASE. PLEASE. PLEASE BE VERY CAREFUL...

This is NOT a tip of sorts, You remember 'RAMBRANT' on the cover disc (Octobeer issue), well Andrew Soloman very kindly sent me a disc with the 'Manual DOC' files on how the program works, there are also some pictures that can be printed out from the program, I'm not sure and Andrew doesn't say, if he drew the pictures or if they are supplied with the manual as examples.

If you want the manual, please send a disc and a SSAE, TA !






ARTHUR BAGGOTT.

ROUTEPLANNER

BY BRIAN FURSE.

UP DATE.

If you read December 1995 issue of CPCSW, you would have seen my review on 'Routeplanner' V. 1 .11 and my conclusions were then that " It was very impressive and a useful utility with the only downside to the program being that route calculations were slow on long routes ".

Richard Fairhurst has recently updated this program and Angela Cook has kindly supplied CPCSN with V.1.2. for a review cupdate.

With the update, Richard has addressed the calculation times and ammended motorway additions. The rest of the program is as it was in V.1.1, with it's comprehensive menus and the options of access by Mouse, Cursor Keys or Control+ Keys. Therefore I shall concern this review on the ammendments only.

With U.1.11, I tested the calculation times by setting the route between two towns that were the farthest apart on the map, Penzance and John O'Groats. The results were that by selecting the shortest route took 32 minutes and the quickest route took 27 minutes. I concluded that as the end result was precise, if it took a bit of time that was OK so I decided to go and make my self a cuppa whilest awaiting another result.

Well onto V.1.2. On running the program, during the initial loading the legend -V.1.2.(c)
______, System D - appears on the bottom right of the screen.

bottom right of the screen. I mention this as on printing out the route, I found the Headings were unchanged and referred to V.1.11.

I decided that the best way to compare the new version with it's predecessor was to use the same tests as before. I expected there would be maybe a 50 % reduction in time. I keyed in the route for Penzants to John O'Groats, selected the shortest route and went off to make my self a cup of coffee.

On my return about 10 minutes later. I was extremely surprised to see that the calculation was completed and the map was aiready drawn on the screen. So out with the stop watch and start again. The result this time was 3 minutes and 20 seconds for the calculation. also I noticed that on the clock icon which indicate a calculation is in progress, the hand revolved at a steady race, whereas on the earlier version it started and stopped intermittantly. The remarkable reduction in calculation times appears to be Sustem D.

You need to load Routeplanner to find the continuation of this review...Dave > >>....

Routeplanner ...

The calculation speeds are not proportional to distance but on the complexity of roads. For instance, testing a medium distance route, Paignton to Coventry on V.1.11. the calculation time for the shortest route took 2 minutes and on V.1.2. the time was 35 seconds.

This program is now in the same class as PC types such as Auto Route Express, not quite oPTIONS as quick nor does it have many features, but I found Routeplanner more accurate for some routes, the PC programs emphasises motorways as the quickest routes, irrespective of holdups due to over capacity where said motorwaya pass through cities at peak times.

Routeplanner cost's £14=99, if you have the earlier version and wish to have it updated, send back your disc with £7=99 to Angela.

Talking on the telephone to one or two of you, I asked for a program that was good at converting Multiface saved screens to normal screen files. well Dave Caleno sent me one, thanks dave, I also received another from ??? I have no idea as it wasn't signed or any address on the paper it was written on, well I tried it, but there was a fault on it. So I asked Barrie Snell if he could help, and Help he did, Thanks Barrie . Not only did Barrie put the program to right, but he also explained one or two things about the program, so I would like to share this information with you all, I'm sure Barrie wont mind.

Now, to programmers out there, you can notice at once were the problem arrises, but to idiots like me, not so.

So turn over the page to see what the problems where.....

Barrie sorts it out...

When I ran the original program, I got the error message'operand missing' in line one. And Barrie went on to mention that even if I sorted that line out, I would have had problems the other two lines. So how did Barrie sort it out for me? LOOK BACK at the original program the three lines, the colon (:) shouldn't have been there, also the character '&' was missing, likewise the colon in lines two and three shouldn't have been there either.

Barrie very nicely made the 3 line program (that didn't work into a 5 line program that did). He then went on to explain a little about the program...

First of all, all multiface screens are saved with a .BIN sytept.ion (TE:)"SCREEN.BIN".file. it not only stores the 16K (84000) of screen butes, but the mode, border and ink colours as well. Plus a little machine code program to let the user see the screen. This adds an extra 140 bytes to the length of the .BIN file which is why it wont load directly into the computers screen area. Also theres the matter of the "execution" address, which is set at 88000 by the multiface program whereas it shouldn't be anuthing (or more correctly, it should be &80000) for a normal SCREEN.SCR file. So all you have to do is to load in the BIN file. Strip off the unwanted 140 bytes, and redirect the "execution" address to zero.

Barrie said in his letter that from the letter I sent to him, he could see that I'm not 'into' programming as such, so he wouldn't waste time by waffling on about the ins and outs of such details, but he would mention some of the lines to make sense.

What it did make me do was to turn out the Amstrad manual and look at different parts of programs that is printed in it to see if I could have avoided making these mistakes or having to impose upon Barrie to sort it out for me. But it is as Barrie stated, I'm not into programming as such...

My thanks go to Barrie for not only sorting the program out, but taking the trouble to try in explaining it to me. I wonder if I could persuade Barrie to do a series of BASIC tutorials for us or for idiots like me.... How about it Barrie????



If Barrie is unable to help due to other commitments, is there anyone else out there who would like a go.

NIGEL CALLCUTT MR. FIXIT.

Having got my self a 6128 plus machine, I asked Nigel for a simple re-set switch, not having any details of the PCB lay-out I asked the expert...


Nigel states this is a simple but effective switch, just like the one used on the Multiface...

This switch can be used for the Standard CPC's or the plus machines.

So what materials do we need ????...

Two lengths of wire and a (PUSH TO MAKE SWITCH TYPE) it only cost me 75p for the switch, the two lengths of wire from an old cable.

All you have to do is to Solder a length of wire to PIN 26 (re-set) of the Z80, another length to PIN 29 (ground). The other ends of the wires to the switch just like the drawing...



Never use a SPDT (Single Pull Double Throw) confuses Z80.

I have fitted this switch on my standard 6128, one day I will delve inside of the plus to fit this switch...

PIN BALL


Do I play games ? was a question asked. Well to tell the truth, The only game that I do like playing with is <u>PIN BALL</u>.

CPC S-W *CODERS FORUM*

Welcome to CPC S-W Coders Forum a new section of you local and not so local fanzine that offers you help with your machine coding queries. The Coders Forum advert is on the Coverdisc so I'll leave it up to you to look there for more information. Machine code is where you get to do what you want to do. You can use the 'Unique' CPC emmbedded software which is contained on your computers internal System ROMS. These provide instant access to the same Code that BASIC uses to for example change screen mode, sound the cursor beep and load files from disc etc etc.

But whats the point of accessing these built in routines from machine code when it is easier to access them from BASIC? The main advantage is extra speed and flexibility!

Extra flexibility because you are 100% in control and Extra speed because you control in what order things are executed. Once you are comfortable (depends on how you progress) you will probably want to write your own Customised routines to achieve the quickest and best results that the CPC range of machines is clearly capable. You will move onto this as a matter of natural progression (if you continue) as many of the in-built routines encompass a number of tasks. So naturally you may want to write your own routines to do 'exactly and no more' than is needed.

May I point out that although Coders Forum is not set out as a machine code tutorial it will in essence be here to help anyone with problems. Doesn't matter if it's just something you can't quite grasp or if you are totally stuck. I will try and answer all you questions and will be able to recommend sources of information.

For information regarding the 'in-built' routines of you CPC you should try and get a copy of 'SOFT 968 Firmware Manual'.

The following assembler listing is of a Simple Screen Clearer for those of you without one there is a BASIC file on the Coverdisc for you to RUN"SCRCLR". Here is that listing in fully commented form:-

ORG &8000 ;Addr to Assemble to NOLIST ;Turn off Assembler screen list

LD B,255 ;B is a single register in this case it ;is used as a +Counter+

.SETUP ;this is a label it defines a reference point

Firstly a few values are Setup

PAGE LAYOUT

I'm quite often asked how I lay-out the pages in the magazine, and what is is the best way for a member to send in an article etc.

Firstly, lets cover how I would prefer to receive the article. On a Disc or a Hardcopy is suffice, I can then import onto the page and play around with it to fit the page lengths, ideally, the text that you send to me saved in 1 K blocks.

IE: Article1.txt 1K.
Article2.txt 1K.

Mot only does this help me, but we keep to the same font, and I can place clip art on the page as well if needed, also there is the matter of keeping the lines of text within the opposite columns together thus improving the magazines appearance.

So instead of members sending in pages that they create on Powerpage for the magazine, I do prefer articles etc in text form either on a disc or as a Hardcopy.I'm glad to see members using Powerpage

but I think you will be able to understand my reasons wanting articles etc in text format rather than Powerpage Format.

Which also now nicely allows me to mention that there is a new Powerpage Professional program that I hope to be in my possession in a few days time, which works different from the 128 version, so any pages sent will not quite work.


But for those of you who are interested, here is the set-up.

The numbers represent the x,y,coordinates taken from the Top of the screen and the Left side of the screen.

The Headlines is first typed in using the headline generator, and saved as a .CUT file, then imported onto the page.

The Columns are then set with the Left hand column starting 51 and the Right hand Column starting at 340, set about 145 from left to right to make up a column.
